



InfraGard Journal Volume 2 - Call for Papers

We invite submissions for the second volume of the InfraGard Journal, a multidisciplinary, peer-reviewed journal focusing on the protection of critical U.S. infrastructure. In order to be considered for the June 2019 issue, submissions should be received by **March 31, 2019**. We invite authors from academia, industry, and government to submit research studies (theoretical and/or empirical), case studies, and other innovative articles relating to domestic infrastructure security. There is no submission fee, and submissions should be sent via email to the journal's co-editors, Dr. Ryan Williams (University of Arizona) and Don Franke, via the Journal's email address SUBMISSIONS@infragardnational.org. The editorial team will evaluate all articles, and if appropriate, send to peer reviewers. Authors will be updated at all stages of the review process.

Submission Guidelines¹:

Write in plain English. Excessive military, law enforcement or security acronyms and jargon will alienate many readers and result in an inability to discuss an issue consistently and coherently. Write for a broad audience. Manuscripts are evaluated by the InfraGard Journal on the understanding that they have been submitted solely to it and that they have not been previously published or previously accepted for publication either in whole or in part. This includes publication, in whole or in part, in practitioner-oriented outlets. If you need clarification of this policy, please contact the Co-Editors. The InfraGard Journal uses a single-blind review process. The title page should therefore include:

- Full names of all authors
- Current positions/prospective assignments of author(s)
- Email addresses of author(s)
- Physical mailing addresses of author(s)
- Abstract of up to 200 words.

Articles should be between 2,500 and 5,000 words, not counting any tables for empirical articles and/or proofs for theoretical articles. Initial submissions may be in PDF or Word format, and accepted articles should be in Microsoft Word, with the style tags removed for editing. Articles

should use 12-point Times New Roman and use 1” margins. For mathematical symbols, Greek letters, and other special characters, use normal text or Symbol font.

Footnotes should be used sparingly. The format for footnotes, citations, and references must follow The Chicago Manual of Style, 16th ed.

Guidelines of basic scholarship apply to book reviews. Reviewers should evaluate the book's contribution (be it positive or negative) to the larger body of scholarship on the topic, using specific examples. Criteria for evaluation include the style, authority, and objectivity of the book. Reviews can be 800-1,000 words in length.

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
